Light refreshments will be served.




Horse Naming Contest



The Logan County Historical Society and History Center will have its 0.25 mill operating levy on the November 5th, 2019 ballot. The 5-year levy would help the Society and History Center continue to better serve and educate the people of Logan County through exhibits, school tours, special events, publications, historic presentations and much more.

The 0.25 mill replacement levy will cost the home owners very little money. A resident whose home is valued at \$100,000 will probably pay under \$10 per year (the present evaluations have not been released yet). As our levy slogan

goes It Costs So Little to Save So Much!

The passing of the levy is necessary for the History Center to continue to be open year-round (seven days a week between office & museum hours), employ a professional staff and continue the upkeep and improvement of the History Center's 1906 Orr Mansion, the Logan County Museum and the Logan County Transportation Museum.

The levy would also make it possible for the Society to continue its many programs and projects and develop new ones. The Society offers a variety of programs including bimonthly meetings, speeches to groups, school tours and programs (nearly 1,000 students in the 2018-2019 and over 150 hours of local history instruction) and much more. The Historical Society is very proud of its relationship with area schools and the role it plays in the students' education. Our Young Historians club has also been a great success over the years with its members learning about the county's rich history through a variety of fun and interactive activities.

It would be impossible for us to include all that the Logan County Historical Society and Museum provides to the people of Logan County. The support from the citizens of Logan County in the past has made it possible for the Logan County History Center to become one of the most respected county historical society museums in the state. The county's support through the operating levy is truly exceptional and greatly appreciated. We hope you will once again support us on November 5th.

We need our members' help to pass the levy:

- Please talk to your neighbors, friends, co-workers and family about the importance of the Historical Society and the levy.
- Better yet bring them to the History Center so they can see first-hand what we are doing.
- Help us by placing a levy sign in your yard and asking friends to do the same.
- We also need help locating and getting permission to place levy signs in high traffic areas throughout the county.
- Serve on our levy committee.

Logan County Historical Society Membership Meeting October 16th at 7:00 p.m.

"The Dependence on European Trade Goods by 18th Century Native Americans in the Ohio Country"

A visual study of recovered materials from 1760s~1790s era Historic Indian sites in Ohio

Presented by Wm Gregory Shipley

Mr Shipley's program will discuss the obvious changes to the material culture of Ohio's Historic Indian tribes which had occurred by the second half of the 18th century. These changes resulted from the increased availability of European trade goods. After a century of having access to the numerous varieties of durable trade items, which were being obtained with increasing ease and in larger quantities, the majority of discarded, lost, and/or abandoned materials on Native American sites had become "Euro", in flavor. Through his PowerPoint presentation, Mr Shipley will share images and data summaries on the various categories of Indian trade (and raid) related weapons, tools, storage vessels, ornamental items, etc, which have been recovered from a dozen private-property village sites, in central and western Ohio, during the past 26 years of avocational archaeological investigations.

The meeting will be held on Wednesday, October 16th at 7:00 p.m. in the AcuSport Meeting Room and is free and open to the public.

About Wm Gregory (Greg) Shipley

At age six, Greg Shipley's fascination with archaeology began with his finding an arrowhead on his family farm. This chance discovery sparked a life-long interest in forgotten peoples and the cultural materials that they left behind. During the past fifty-eight years, this passion for lost history has only grown.

A lifelong resident of Champaign County, Ohio, save for his college years at The Ohio State University, Greg and his wife, Linda, recently relocated to a home outside of West Liberty, in Logan County. Greg's work career was with Honda of America, where he served as an Engineering Coordinator for Vehicle Quality & Automotive New Model assignments. Since his retirement, Greg has devoted much of his time to more lengthy and detailed site investigations, which, includes using of the latest technologies.

Greg's amateur archaeological activities include personally conducted excavation projects at dozens of prehistoric and historical period locations in Ohio, Kentucky, Illinois, Tennessee, Arkansas and Missouri. Cultural periods investigated include: Ohio Archaic, Woodland, Fort Ancient, Mississippian + 18th Century Native American sites and 1790s~War of 1812 military sites in Western Ohio.

ZANESFIELD Turns 200 Years Old!

The people of Zanesfield have seemingly been instilled with an appreciation of their history. People like O.K. Reames, Herman Marmon and Guy Furbay did as much as anyone to preserve and promote the rich history of Zanesfield and Logan County. Many of the founders and early members of the Logan County Archaeological and Historical Society (now Logan County Historical Society) hailed from Zanesfield. Some of the first historical markers were erected in Zanesfield. The village hosted annual historical pageants for years and then decades later began hosting the pageants again. The people of Zanesfield even moved a 60-ton boulder to turn into a monument for two of their past prominent residents, Isaac Zane and Simon Kenton!

The History Center is celebrating Zanesfield's Bicentennial with an exhibit. The

Niles J. Fulwyler graduated from Zanesfield High School in 1948. He joined the army in 1952 after graduating from BGSU. Fulwyler's 30+ year military career saw him serve two tours in Vietnam, work on the U.S. Army Staff in Washington, D.C and hold many other positions in the army. Fulwyler served as the Commanding General of White Sands Missile Range for his final assignment. Fulwyler retired with the rank of Major General, perhaps the highest of any Logan County native.




